
Welcome

The Science Department has signed up to become an Ecoschool, a National project that enables schools to choose different environmental awareness schemes.




Students in year 9 have been choosing and completing different tasks in lessons. In the final week before Christmas, as part of the global citizenship topic they carried out a Book, Toy and Cake Sale and raised over £100 to be shared between the RSPCA and WWF. The hot chocolate with marshmallows was a big hit in the cold weather and the queue went right around the library. Other groups are continuing to work on the Biodiversity project, promoting insect and bird life within the school, saving energy and reducing waste.



The Art Department took 54 Year II and Sixth Form Art students to the Tate Museum in London. The museum holds the largest collection of British Art in the world, dating from the 1500s to the modern day. Notable artists on display include William Hogarth, JMW Turner and Francis Bacon. In the afternoon, students took the ferry to the Tate Modern to see 20th Century Art. How paintings represent society and changing ideas is vital to their studies. The History Department have been highlighting significant historical events to help students across the school widen their cultural understanding of the world around them. We have teamed up again with the Lessons from Auschwitz project to send two of our hardworking year 12's to Auschwitz to complete a project on the significance of the Holocaust. They will be involved in a 3 day event before compiling a report on their experience to emphasise the importance of remembering the Holocaust. We have also created a Holocaust display board so that all of our

students can have an understanding not just of the events but also of the power of will to survive one of the worst genocides the world has ever seen. We have focused on those that survived and their messages of love and empowerment striving for a better future. We have also included information from this into our weekly house competition to emphasise the importance of the Holocaust.

STEM Update

Did you know STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths? We run a variety of clubs giving students the opportunity to enjoy these subjects out of the classroom including:

Judo Robots - This is a KS3 club where students design and make their own hydraulic fighting robots out of sticks and elastic bands!

Airgineers - This is a KS4 club where students design and make their own remote controlled drones.

Flow Cytometry Project - This is a sixth form project, run in conjunction with the University of Cambridge and funded by The Royal Society looking at the changing climatological conditions in our pond flora. A flow cytometry machine shines a laser through water and depending on the scattered light can detect the particles suspended in the water. We believe we are the only school in the country with one of these machines as they are usually taught at University due to their complexity and cost.

For the last ten years, we have been involved in judging The Royal Society Young People's Book prize. Our Science book group chose Fourteen Wolves as their favourite book. They met on Tuesday lunchtimes, looked at the six shortlisted books and marked them for their ease of reading, interest, look and feel and whether the book inspired them. They chose Fourteen Wolves and have submitted their results to The Royal Society and the overall winner will be announced in March.

Year 11 students, assisted by year 7 have also set up a 'Blind Date with a book' initiative where they took a number of books, and wrapped them in brown paper, writing on them a few hints as to what might be inside. It's a great way to discover a new author or just try something a bit different.
